As we approach the end of the spring semester, GSAS would like to remind faculty of the early dissertation or master's thesis/paper/capstone project completion tuition waiver policy, which would apply to students who plan to complete an August degree. All students must register for the term in which they plan to complete their degree. PhD students should register for CONT 500 (in fall or spring) or CONT 250 (in summer), and master's students should register for CONT 200 (or the department equivalent). If a student completes their dissertation or master's thesis/paper/capstone project within ten (10) business days of the first day of classes for that term, or, in the summer, within ten (10) business days of Commencement, they will receive a full tuition waiver. Completion is defined as follows:

For a PhD dissertation or a master's thesis: Deposit of the dissertation or thesis to ProQuest ETD. For more information about this process, visit our **Thesis and Dissertation Guide**.

For a master's paper or capstone project: Acceptance of the paper or project by the program. Students should immediately <u>notify Abigail Arnold</u> once the paper or project is accepted.

Students should complete the <u>application to graduate</u> as soon as it is available for the semester.

Graduating Student and Alum Email Accounts

Brandeis.edu accounts that many alums use to log into email and other services will be discontinued effective January 7, 2025. This change aligns with industry best practices and improves email security. Over the coming months, information will be shared with alums to support them through this transition and ensure continued access to available alum resources.

As part of the initial communication to the Brandeis alum community, Brandeis also announced the launch of a new alum portal called My Brandeis Gateway. This new online resource enables alums to update contact and employment information, search the alum directory, and submit class notes.

New alumni who are graduating in May 2024 and beyond will retain their student @brandeis.edu accounts during a seven-month grace period following commencement.

For academic departments and centers/institutes that manually maintain their own lists of alum constituents with @brandeis.edu email addresses, Alumni Relations will provide updated lists. If you have questions or require assistance with lists of alum constituents, please <u>contact Alumni Relations</u>.

Fall 2024 Graduate Department Reps

Becky Prigge will email program administrators and graduate directors in mid-August with a spreadsheet where you can note your GDR changes as they become available. GSAS will contact the GDRs directly to ensure they have submitted the proper paperwork needed to be paid the stipend at the end of the semester.

As a reminder, GDRs receive a \$125 stipend at the end of the fall and spring semesters. Due to expected budget cuts for the next academic year, GSAS will only provide a stipend for two GDRs per program moving forward. If a program would like more than two GDRs, the stipend will need to be covered by the program through GTR. While the stipend is small, it becomes a significant portion of the overall student programming budget due to the number of

programs we have. We're trying to stretch whatever we get for next year to serve as many students as possible!
